LECTURE PROGRAMME 2025-26

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9 October 2025: THE ART OF THE CARTOONIST (Harry Venning) a professional cartoonist for more than 30 years, Harry will trace the history of his profession from Cruikshank and Hogarth to more recent artists like Giles and Schulz, bringing events up to date with cartoons produced fresh from the page that very day.

13 November 2025: LONDON BRIDGED: 3,500 YEARS OF CROSSING THE THAMES (Charlie Forman) There have been crossings over the Thames since the Bronze Age, and the last 200 years have seen more than 50 new crossings under and over the river. Some are great feats of engineering; others are architecturally elegant. Every river crossing changes the city's genetic code.

4* December 2025: CARAVAGGIO (Rosalind Whyte) The most famous painter in Italy at the time, Caravaggio produced radical changes in pictorial style, particularly through his pronounced use of light and shade (chiaroscuro),Inspiring hundreds of other artists. However, he was a notorious brawler and spent the last years of his life on the run from a murder charge. *NB first Thursday of the month

8 January 2026: EDOUARD MANET AND MUSIC (Lois Oliver) Music was a constant theme in Manet's life and work. His wife was a gifted pianist and regular soirées were held at the family home. His pictures of musicians and audiences encompass the full range of Parisian musical culture. He also created cover illustrations for music composed by his friends.

12 February 2026: LEE MILLER - WITNESSING WOMEN AT WAR (Antony Penrose) Lee Miller, Antony Penrose's mother, was a woman at war. She shot faultless images for Vogue's haute couture in London's burnt-out streets, as well as documenting refugees from Europe, women accused of collaboration, those forced into slave labour or prostitution and the horror of concentration camp victims.

12 March 2026: POSTCARDS FROM NEAR AND FAR: PICTURING THE TWENTIETH CENTURY (Chloe Sayer)

Postcards have pictured our history across the globe, documenting the changing role of women, royalty, celebrity, cinema, aviation, cars, fashion, travel and more – but now that we have mobile phones, is the age of the postcard finished?

9 April 2026: PAUL AND JOHN NASH - BROTHERS IN ART (James Russell) Growing up in the shadow of their mother's illness, Paul and John Nash emerged as artists in a joint exhibition in 1913. Both served on the Western Front before working together as artists. While remaining close, their art moved in different directions after the war. This is an intriguing story of brotherly love, strife and competition.

14 May 2026: MUCH MORE THAN GATHERING LILICS: THE REAL GENIUS OF IVOR NOVELLO (John Snelson) 2026 marks the 75th anniversary of the death of Ivor Novello, who career was extraordinary: composer, playwright, film idol and stage star. His reputation is sustained today by the romantic waltz song, but there is so much more to his genius than wistful nostalgia.

11 June 2026: GWEN JOHN (Lydia Bauman) Gwen John is known for the quiet strength of the solitary women in her portraits and the reflective stillness of her interiors. She was overshadowed by her famous brother Augustus, but she defied convention to forge her own existence in the heady art worlds of London and Paris. She was a progressive trailblazer, moving in a cultural circle that included her lover, Auguste Rodin.

9 July 2026: A DUTCH LEONARDO: THE EXTRAORDINARY CAREER OF JAN VAN DER HEYDEN (Rupert Dickens) Van der Heyden's reputation pales in comparison with that of Leonardo, but at the height of the Dutch Golden Age was no less extraordinary. As well as being a brilliant painter and draughtsman, he was also an inventor, entrepreneur, administrator and marketing genius whose inventions included a mechanical fire engine and street lighting.
